Funding Framework: Overview

All grant programs are designed to resource and engage a coordinated network of partners providing a continuum of services under a shared vision of helping ALICE individuals and families move from crisis to stability and from stability to prosperity in Wayne, Oakland, Macomb, and Washtenaw County.



Open-Competitive

Fund 1: Community Access & Response Fund

Purpose: <u>Flexible</u> funding for organizations meeting <u>immediate</u>, more acute <u>needs</u> for individuals and families accessing community resources.

Open-Competitive

Fund 2: Wraparound Services & Stability Fund

Purpose: Flexible funding for organizations or established collaboratives providing more wraparound services to stabilize individuals and families.

Closed-Invitation Only

Fund 3: Connect4Care & Systems Change Fund

Purpose: Flexible funding for regionally recognized institutions or collaboratives to address the <u>root</u> <u>causes</u> of ALICE and connect individuals to more integrated, seamless and dignified systems of care that support <u>lasting</u>, <u>long-term stability</u> for individuals and families at <u>scale</u>.

Fund 1: Community Access & Response Fund

Open-Competitive

Community Access & Response Fund

Purpose: <u>Flexible</u> funding for organizations meeting <u>immediate</u>, more acute <u>needs</u> for individuals and families accessing community resources.

- 1. Focus is on the delivery of services that meet an individual or families' immediate need.
- 2. Priority areas and eligible services are identified upfront based on 2-1-1, community-level data and feedback from partners.
- 3. For the 2025-2026 Funding Cycle, the priorities are:
 - a. Emergency food assistance Pantries, Community/Soup Kitchens, Food Vouchers or Gift Cards
 - b. Homelessness diversion/prevention Emergency rental assistance, application fees, utility assistance, legal assistance, arrears, moving costs, etc.
 - c. Out-of-school time support Enrichment programming, Before-School, After-School, Break programming/care
 - d. Interventions that address chronic absenteeism Single Subject Tutoring or Literacy Support, Eliminating socioeconomic barriers i.e. transportation, laundry, warm weather gear, etc., Social Emotional Learning



Fund 2: Wraparound Services & Stability Fund

Open-Competitive

Wraparound Services & Stability Fund

Purpose: <u>Flexible</u> funding for organizations or established collaboratives providing more wraparound services to stabilize individuals and families.

- 1. Organization's whose services go beyond addressing individual, immediate needs, and instead offer programs that address multiple conditions that impact a household's well-being and quality of life.
 - a. Examples of conditions may include: safe housing, equitable education access, income, access to nutritious food, integrated student supports aimed at eliminating family barriers, etc.
- 2. Organizations will demonstrate how they connect individuals to a variety of supports that help them move along a pathway to stability.
- 3. Agencies can apply as an individual or established collaborative.
 - a. Demonstrate history of working together for at least one year.
 - b. Submit single application with lead organization and list of additional partners.
- 4. Award Range: \$50k \$150k


Wraparound Services & Stability Fund

Scorable Criteria

- Understanding barriers ALICE families encounter and evidence that programming addresses them
- History of providing wrapround support
- Evidence of how care is coordinated
- Evidence of moving clients from crisis to stability
- Priority Populations Served
- Scale # of individuals served & geographic footprint
- Geographic service area overlap with high ALICE municipalities
- Projected impact/outcomes from requested funds
- Financial eligibility/viability
- Budget integrity & alignment to program scope
- Diversification of funding for proposed program


If this is your first time applying for a United Way for Southeastern Michigan grant through Survey Monkey Apply - Complete this first!


Organizations will also use this application to keep their information updated throughout the year and to submit their yearly audited financial statements according to United Way audit requirements.
















Charitable Solicitation Registration





MiTAHIE Community-Based Organizations (CBOs) Survey

Thank you for agreeing to participate in the Michigan Technical Assistance for Health Information Exchange (MiTAHIE) survey for Community-Based Organizations (CBOs). In 2022, the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services, MDHHS, established the Community Information Exchange Task Force to develop a statewide strategy to develop infrastructure, policies, and practices for collecting and using social care data across communities.

The MiTAHIE project is an effort between Altarum and the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHSS) to evaluate Michigan's healthcare and social services landscape to be fully prepared to work with all CBOs starting next year. MiTAHIE will provide supportive tools and resources to strengthen organizations' data sharing and connectivity, ensuring smoother communication and better outcomes across health and social care sectors.

To do that, MDHHS and Altarum have worked with Michigan 211 to develop this survey to gather key information from CBOs across the state. This survey will help establish Michigan's healthcare and social services landscape and guide MiTAHIE's next phase of work to support CBOs with Community Information Exchange efforts.

This survey has 23 multiple-choice questions broken up into 7 sections and will take approximately 15 minutes. If you have any questions or concerns please contact us at MITAHIE@altarum.org.
