## **BOARD CHAIR**



This annual report is a testament to the hard work of the United Way team and their network of partners, volunteers, donors and supporters. For the past two years, it was my honor to chair the board of an organization that is helping families meet their immediate needs and creating long-term solutions to our community's most pressing issues.

The number of Asset Limited, Income Constrained, and Employed (ALICE) households has increased to 42% in our four-county region, which includes Macomb, Oakland, Washtenaw and Wayne counties. ALICE families may earn above the Federal Poverty Level, but struggle to afford their basic needs such as food, housing and child care. It is up to us – United Way and our partners – to fill these gaps to help families move from crisis to stability, and from stability to prosperity.

In addition to helping individual households, over the last year United Way once again demonstrated its unique ability to respond quickly to community

need, leveraging resources and convening partners to create solutions in critical moments. We saw this with the floods that devastated southwest Detroit and national pressures on the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). I continue to be proud of what this organization has accomplished over the past fiscal year and excited to see what lies ahead as we expand our efforts and welcome a new board chair, Luanne Thomas Ewald, chief operating officer at the University of Michigan Health's C.S. Mott Children's Hospital and Von Voigtlander Women's Hospital. Our neighbors are counting on us.

The VIP fundraising event and silent auction raised more than \$140,000 to support local families and showcased the incredible power of our automotive industry leaders coming together for a worthy cause.



## United Rivals



NOVEMBER 2024

Weeks before the highly anticipated University of Michigan vs. Ohio State game, we launched United Rivals, a friendly fundraising competition between our United Way and United Way of Central Ohio.

Michigan not only won the game; we raised \$53,711 for families in Southeastern Michigan – \$543 more than United Way of Central Ohio’s total. Together, we celebrated that United Rivals mobilized our communities to donate over \$100,000.

DECEMBER 2024

Labor of Love

The Labor of Love event expanded from Ypsilanti to Detroit – giving Christmas gifts and hosting a holiday party at UAW Local 900 to students from Warren E. Bow Elementary School. As a shining example of our partnership with labor, we received generous donations from Iron Workers Local 25, Michigan Building and Construction Trades Council, Stellantis and UAW Local 174.



JANUARY 2025

STEM Learning Journey

In partnership with Ilitch Holdings, Little Caesars and the Detroit Tigers baseball operations team, we hosted our first-ever Learning Journey event, welcoming 120 fifth-grade students from Stevenson Elementary to tour Comerica Park and the Little Caesars Global Resource Center.

Tech United developed the Learning Journey program to help students explore future STEM career pathways and provide engaging, hands-on experiences that inspire learning, leadership and growth.



Get The Tax Facts (Tax Assistance)



JANUARY - APRIL 2025

In 2025, more than 21,000 people received expert tax preparation through Get The Tax Facts, thanks to our partnership with Accounting Aid Society and Wayne Metro. With the help of 470 IRS-certified volunteers, community members secured more than \$30 million in tax refunds.

“The service is thorough, friendly, courteous and fast,” said Antonio H., a 61-year-old from Highland Park. “Before I started coming here, I was paying \$300 to \$350 for taxes, and now that I do this, it’s like, why would I ever go back?”



Women of Influence Summit

WOMEN OF INFLUENCE SUMMIT MARCH 2025

Our ninth annual Women of Influence Summit raised more than \$405,000, bringing the nine-year total to over \$2 million devoted to the future of young people in our region. The iconic women-owned business marketplace allowed 10 local small businesses to network with a community of more than 700 potential clients.

Several trailblazers were recognized for impactful contributions to our community, including our 2025 Woman of Influence, Suzanne Shank, president and CEO of Siebert Williams Shank & Co, LLC, and lifetime achievement awardee, former U.S. Sen. Debbie Stabenow.

### Power of the Purse

The 17th annual Power of the Purse event raised \$83,500 for the betterment of women and children in Washtenaw County. Over 250 attendees gathered to peruse an auction of over 100 purses. President of Washtenaw Community College, Dr. Rose B. Bellanca, was honored as the 2025 Woman of the Year for her impact and achievements.

"I always come to this event because of two things – women donate purses, and we all love our purses, but more importantly it shows our power in supporting the work United Way does to support so many important nonprofits in our community," said U.S. Rep. Debbie Dingle. "Tonight, it's about the women – speaking up, speaking out and showing the power of the purse."



### Community Investments

JULY 2025

In 2025, United Way invested \$5.2 million into 90 local nonprofit organizations. These grants will play a critical role in meeting the increasing need – serving over 290,000 individuals and families across Macomb, Oakland, Washtenaw and Wayne counties.

"The support we have received from United Way of Southeastern Michigan has made it possible for us to not only continue supporting local pantries, but also expand upon our mobile direct distributions," said Merissa Pacholek, program manager at the Community Food Bank of Macomb County. "Without the assistance from United Way, our at-risk, in-need neighbors may not receive the nutritional support their family so desperately needs."

MARCH 2025

### Literacy Fairs

Throughout the fiscal year, United Way distributed 13,683 books to over 3,360 local children. From book fairs to 28 stocked Little Free Libraries across local communities, United Way strives to bring literacy directly into homes and neighborhoods to inspire a lifelong love of reading.

The Detroit Red Wings Foundation continued its Red Wings for Reading program – providing over 600 students with 3,000 books. Red Wings Center Marco Kasper visited students during the book fair at New Paradigm Glazer Academy in Detroit to help students select free books to build their own home libraries.



MAY 2025

### Sneaker Ball

The Sneaker Ball, hosted by our United Way Labor Relations team, raised \$26,000 for programs like UCAN Training, Youth Skilled Trades Education and Labor of Love.

"Our labor family always shows up and shows out for our community," said Alicia Dennis, labor relations director at United Way for Southeastern Michigan. "At the end of the day, it's about more than sneakers – it's about standing together for our kids and our future."

### Back-to-School Backpacks

For the 2025 back-to-school season, United Way mobilized 188 volunteers from 15 corporate partners to stuff 6,875 backpacks and 52 bulk classroom kits for local students.

“We are benefiting the economy for years to come. The children who have school supplies now can be better students and better citizens,” said Jocelyn Howard, board member at United Way for Southeastern Michigan. “You will be able to see the change in a child right away. Even though they may never see us, they can always remember the impact.”

### Summer Discovery

Thanks to a \$62 million grant from Ballmer Group, 26,778 K-8 students participated in summer enrichment programs at 169 sites across our region. As we look ahead to Summer 2026, we're aiming to reach even more students, deepen existing partnerships and create new ones.

Summer Discovery outpaced all comparable summer programs, with students' proficiency rising by 17 points in English Language Arts and 20 points in Math. According to 97% of grantees and 93% of families, Summer Discovery students are better prepared for the new school year.

### Healthy School Meals Advocacy

Last fall, our Advocacy team stood up for students' basic needs and successfully convinced state leaders to fund the Michigan Healthy Meals program. Thanks to their tireless efforts, all Michigan public school students from Pre-K to 12 are receiving free breakfast and lunch throughout the school year, which drives improved student well-being and academic achievement.

“Their mother told us, ‘For the first time in a long time, I know they're getting two full meals a day, and I can finally breathe a little easier,’” said Zachary Roberts, director of dining services at Lincoln Consolidated Schools. “It reminded us that feeding students isn't just about food – it's about equity, dignity and the ability to learn and grow without unnecessary barriers.”

### Run United

The sixth annual Run United Virtual Marathon raised \$201,456 to support STEAM classroom materials grants that will provide students with hands-on learning opportunities from robotics kits to butterfly farms.

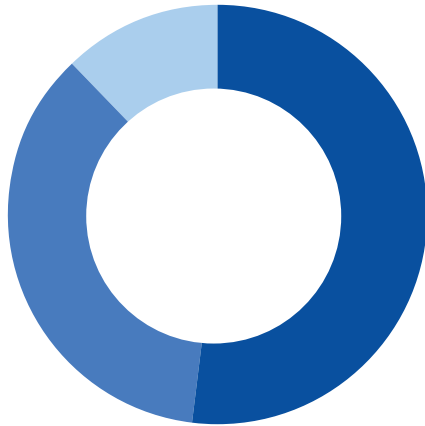

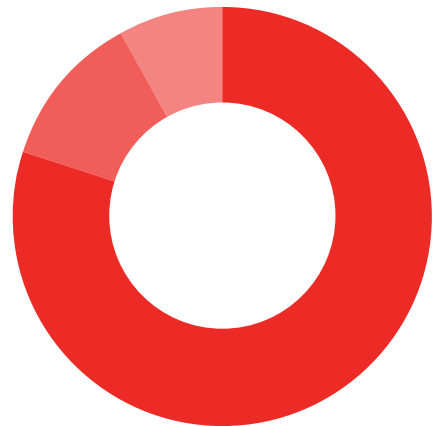
